An Opportunity for Truth Telling, Healing and Reconciliation, a Message from our Executive Director

HEATHER GEORGE, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Shé:kon sewakwé:kon skennen'kó:wa ken? Hello, are you at peace/ do you follow the great peace.

I'm pleased to have the opportunity to connect with all of you early on in my role as Executive Director. As someone who grew up off-reserve and disconnected from culture until my early 20s I have spent the last two decades re-connecting and learning from brilliant, kind, and deeply philosophical Onkwehonwe and Hodinohsho:ni community leaders and academics. For example, the phrase "are you at peace" not only references our Great Law and the formation of the Confederacy but also one of our core cultural tenants – the importance of good-mindedness.

The Woodland Cultural Centre plays a significant role in fostering a spirit of good-mindedness both for Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples. Its establishment two years after the closing of the Mohawk Institute Residential School was a direct and beautiful moment of good-mindedness and self determination – an opportunity for truth telling, healing and reconciliation – long before the term "Truth and Reconciliation" was a common part of our vocabulary.





Woodland has always relied on the generosity of donors to undertake its important programing to support language, education, art, research, culture and heritage and we need this support now more than ever. As we look forward to the opening of the former Mohawk Institute for tours and interpretation in late 2024, we know that the stories of loss and grief must be balanced with stories of resilience, self determination and cultural beauty throughout our organization.

At a time when we all need more joy, hope, beauty and kindness in our lives, we hope we can continue to count on the generosity of you, our donors in helping to ensure continued opportunities for healing and relationship building through culture, arts and heritage.

I hope my note finds you all at peace. I am so grateful to each and every one of you for your support. I look forward to meeting you in the coming year, and please know that my virtual and physical door is always open.

Funds raised will go to support education programming to ensure that we can continue to deliver the highest quality programs centered on a Hodinohsho:ni worldview, celebrating, and sharing Indigenous cultures, languages, and art.

The Great Canadian Giving Challenge happens every June and is a month-long fundraising initiative to bring awareness and support to charities. Every dollar donated to WCC in June, via CanadaHelps.org or CanadaHelps fundraising tools, is an entry for a chance to win \$20,000!

Save the Evidence Update, Restoration on the Former Mohawk Institute Residential School is well on the way to Completion



We have some exciting updates to share about the physical restoration of the former Mohawk Institute! Thanks to the generosity of the Save the Evidence campaign donors, corporate donors and government partners, the restoration will likely be completed in late 2024. Significant work has been completed by our General Contractor, Robertson Restoration and architects, Quartek Group. The final phase of the restoration is called Phase 3 and to date we are in the process of completing:

- The complex installation of an elevator shaft,
- Infrastructure for the install of a generator to ensure the archives and other sensitive materials will be safe during any power outages,
- We have started the extensive repairs to the masonry on the exterior of the building which is in very bad repair,
- Infrastructure work has started on the accessibility ramps,
- An accessible washroom,
- Preparing the site for resurfacing,
- Replacement of the remaining historic windows,
- · And more.

Unfortunately, the resurfacing will cause some disruptions to access so please check the <u>Woodland Cultural</u> <u>Centre website</u> for updates. Alternative parking will be very accessible and the Museum will remain open.

The site will be the only fully restored residential school site in the country and will open as a heritage site alongside the Woodland Cultural Centre Museum and Art Gallery, and beside the Mohawk Village Memorial Park.

The restoration project has always been rooted in community with important partnerships with the Survivors Secretariat, who are responsible for the ground search and with the Survivors through consultations. It is this collective energy that supports the restoration project towards its realization.

We would like to thank all the project supporters as well as the City of Brantford, Six Nations of the Grand River Council, Province of Ontario and Government of Canada for their generous support and we look forward to welcoming everyone when the site opens.

Update from the Mohawk Village Memorial Park


Despite the setback of Covid-19, the Mohawk Village Memorial Park continues to move forward with park initiatives. A 10 car parking lot on the grounds will be completed this fall and some apple trees have been planted.
